# FEBRUARY 2025 Celebrating the IMARIKA project in Tanzania



**Ibrahimu Abdul** (EITZ Project Manager) and Jesca Mgimba (EITZ Project Officer) prepared a report on the activities in the IMARIKA project during 2024. We share a transcription here to celebrate the successes of this project!

The word 'IMARIKA" is the Swahili word meaning "be strengthened". The Imarika project is based on strengthening church, community and environment in general. It is managed by Emmanuel International in partnership with the Anglican Church Diocese of Ruaha. In 2024 the project aim was to reach 1000 people and 200 households. IMARIKA project started to work in Kilolo district and the Iringa rural district after finding out that the conditions of the community members are very poor. Government aid is minimal and the Church needed help to serve its community.

IMARIKA is an integrated project that selects from elements that are suitable for each community. In 2024 the following were completed:

# Beekeeping

Providing basic education about how to keep bees, helping the group to secure equipment such as hives, bee suits, smokers, etc.

Kising'a harvested 1,600 liters of honey, Mafuluto 68 liters and Usolanga 26 liters. This was sold for TZS5000 (£1.50) per liter.

# **Tree Planting**

Seeds are distributed for preparing nurseries. A total of 12,400 seedlings were planted. 2,340 trees were sold for TZS3000 (90p) per tree.



# Preparing for tree nurseries Poultry Farming

350 members were trained on the best methods and breeds of modern poultry. Sheds have been constructed.

# **Conservation Agriculture**

All the groups cultivated a farm and are maintaining through weeding. Farms include 10 acres of sunflower, 5 acres of tomatoes and 10 acres of groundnuts.

Utelenge harvested 22 bags of maize (raising TZS2,2 million or £660) and 32 bags of sunflower seed (raising TZS150k

or £45). Lupembe sold 7 bags of maize for TZS700k or £210). Mbigili village managed to buy an irrigation machine for their tomato farms with their profit.

# **Fuel Efficient Stoves**

Provided eduation on environmental conservation through the use a fuel efficient stove rather than a traditional 3 stone fire.

#### Entrepreneurship

Education has been provided on how to establish and manage a small business, how to overcome challenges and how to keep records of sales and profit.

# **Core Training**

A new village, Kalenga, has been given basic education on community and development, using available resources.

# Leadership

The leadership of new groups were given training once elected.

# VICOBA

The Village Community Banking (VICOBA) cycle has ended and a total of TZS777,824,500 or nearly £235K was saved by all the groups!



Kising'a group provided 100 chairs to their village, to be used during social meetings, paid for from their social fund. They also provided school uniforms and shoes to orphans and bought more chairs for the local primary school. They bought a modern stove and a tent for renting to the society to increase their funds in future.

Kanani group bought 120 chairs for the Izazi church and helped widows with sugar, sunflowers and rice. Migoli bought 150 chairs using their social funds as well as contributions from members. Utelenge bought 70 chairs.

# Hot culture

Three villages were trained in the hot culture method and the best seeds have been prepared. Vegetable gardens were successfully established.

# Discipleship

All group members participate in the Bible studies. We distributed 136 Bibles in 2024 and 182 people were born again.

# **Students clubs**

Clubs were started at Ibumu Primary and Ibumu Secondary Schools as well as Lugalo Secondary School. Training has been given and the students have planted trees.

# Milk goats

Research has been started on where to source the best milk goats.

# Networking

In August 2024, a general meeting was held for all IMARIKA members. There were 576 people in attendance.

# **Disaster Fund**

When a group member faces difficulty such as a death in the family, or serious illness, all the IMARIKA groups contribute to a fund to help them. In the first 6 months of 2024, 14 were helped, including 5 with a difficult disease and 4 with the cost of death in the family.

Two groups, Ukombozi and Eden, have graduated, which means that EITZ's supervision is no longer required. The groups are mature and can continue on their own.

Two groups (Miowa and Mafuluto) received financial support from the government in 2024 as recognition for the good work they are doing in agricultural conservation and VICOBA.
